Dear Friends of Circle of Hope,

It's only February, but Circle of Hope has already changed lives in 2020.

In the last month, we launched two new pilot partnerships with healthcare clinics in Dorchester and Roxbury to provide clothing and Welcome Baby items to newborn babies and women who are homeless. With help from our Go-To Crew, we responded to an urgent request from our partner family shelter, Clinton House, and gave warm clothing and blankets to a six month old baby boy. We made nearly 40 deliveries this month to our partner shelters throughout Greater Boston and brought vital winter clothing and outerwear to protect the health and dignity of the vulnerable infants, children, and adults we serve.

We couldn't impact so many lives without you. Thank you to the dozens of donors who immediately responded to our Go-To Crew requests for winter coats, infant and children's clothing, and toiletries last month. I'm very grateful to our generous community for supporting the homeless individuals and families who need our help.

I'm also excited to invite you to our annual spring fundraiser, HOPE Blooms, on Saturday, May 2 at 7:00 p.m. at Needham Golf Club. Please be on the lookout for our official Save the Date, coming soon!



Go-To Crew Success



In January, we ran dangerously low on clothing for infants and toddlers. The manager of Clinton House Family Shelter called us to help a newly arrived family, including a mother and her six month old baby boy. We also needed to send infant and toddler clothing to other family shelters right away, so we asked our Go-To Crew for help. Within days, we received dozens of donations of infant and toddler clothing, some of it brand new! Thank you to our Go-To Crew heroes for your generous response to this urgent need! With your help, we gave winter clothing and blankets to all the babies and toddlers who who are homeless.

The list includes some of our most-needed winter items like hats and mittens for toddlers and school-aged children, winter boots and coats for men, and new socks, gloves, and hats for women and men. These crucial donations bring warmth and health to homeless individuals, helping prevent frostbite, hypothermia, and other exposure-related health conditions.

When asked to select a shipping address, select "Circle of Hope Gift Registry Address" to have the items sent directly to COH. We will give the items you purchase to homeless children and adults in our partner shelters and clinics within two weeks.

New Clinic Partnerships

Circle of Hope is expanding its health clinic partnerships! Already this year, we launched new pilot partnerships with two healthcare centers serving homeless individuals: Bowdoin Health Center in Dorchester and the Dimock Center in Roxbury.

We made our first delivery to Bowdoin Health Center in early January, bringing six

A mom with newborn twins was overjoyed and especially grateful for the warm blankets because the shelter rooms are so cold. We are working closely with the Community Health Workers to help homeless infants thrive in their early months and monitor the success of the Pilot Program over the next six months.

Our first delivery to the Dimock Center took place in early February. We provided clothing, toiletries, and Welcome Baby items to their "Women's Renewal - Clinical Stabilization Services" program. By providing essentials for health and dignity, we help homeless women who are recovering from substance use disorders, mental health disorders, and trauma.

After our first delivery, a clinician at the Dimock Center

said:

"Words cannot express how thankful we are for your contribution. You went over the top and for that we thank you as well as from the clients. Thank you does not cover it."

We're excited to partner with these two healthcare clinics and we're proud to serve more women and infants who are homeless and need our help.
